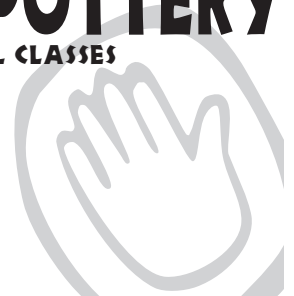

And now I'm especially pleased he has accepted our offer for the permanent position. Many of our volunteers met Mike since he started helping us this summer and they know that Mike loves Radio - including the art, the craft and the science.

BUILDING ON VOLUNTEERS

Students, Staff, Alumni Give Back to UNM, Community

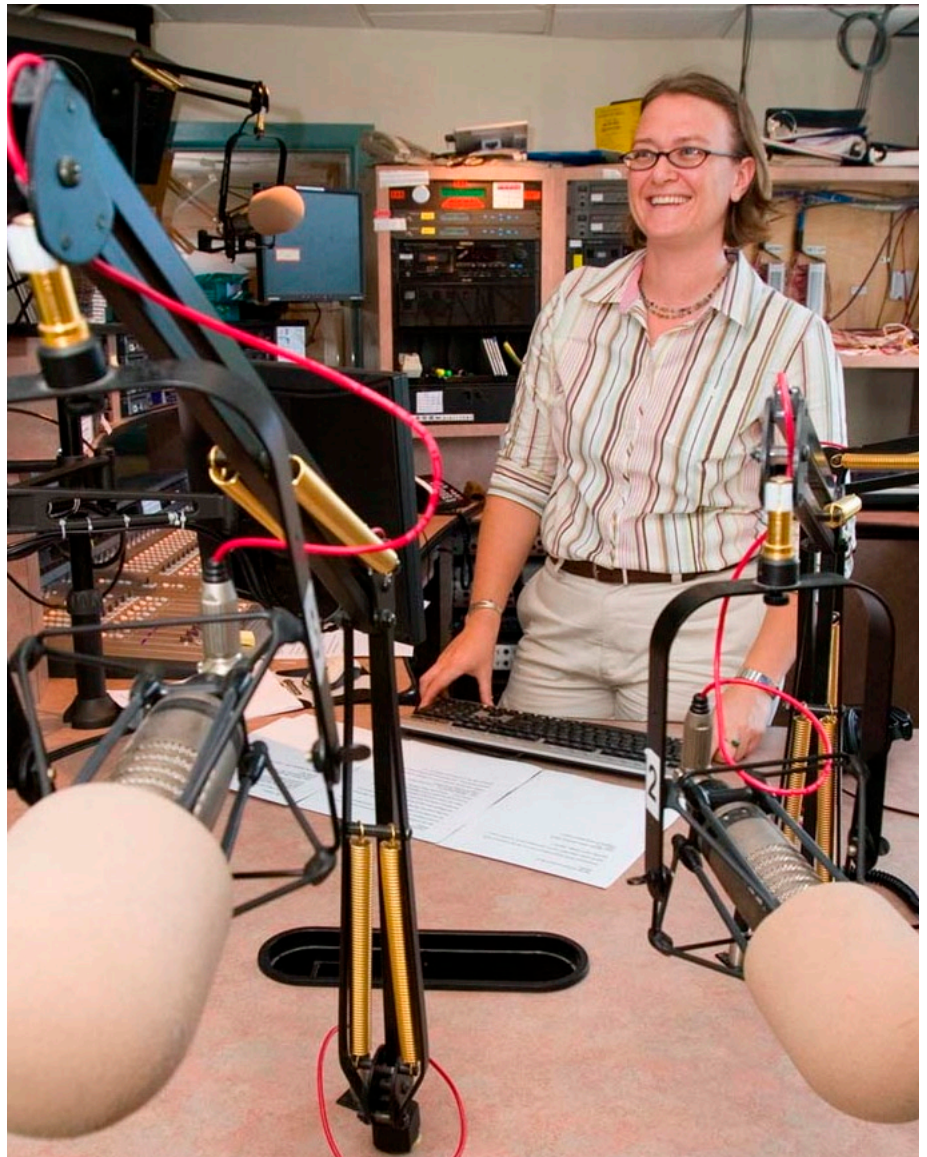
The spirit of volunteerism is alive at UNM in the hearts of many students, staff and alumni. Whether they help run KUNM or participate in Spring Storm, volunteers feel rewarded by contributing their time and talent to a good cause.

UNM Human Resource and Special Projects Manager Mimi Swanson conducted a survey on volunteerism among University employees. Out of 311 responses, 268 reported volunteering. Of the 268, each dedicated at least three and a half hours per week volunteering.

Richard Towne, general manager of KUNM-FM, reports that at any given time, nearly 180 students and alumni volunteer at the radio station on campus. “Students volunteer for the training, as well as out of a sense of civic engagement and community service,” says Towne.

Volunteers not only help run the station, but they also help with fund raising during the spring and fall pledge drives. “This year, we will raise about \$1.3 million,” says Towne. “Volunteerism keeps KUNM connected

to the community and the community connected to our independent, non-commercial radio service.”

Elaine Baumgartel, a graduate student in communication and journalism at UNM, began volunteering at KUNM in 2004. She began by helping host one show on the station, and later helped engineer the programs. Now, she helps host two shows and assists wherever she's needed. “I think in the realm of reward, you can include a sense of investment in your community—a feeling of having made a contribution,” says Baumgartel.

Spring Storm, an annual event to clean up UNM and the community, attracts hundreds of students, staff and alumni volunteers each April. This past year, more than 800 volunteers participated. Tanya Skinner, a junior in elementary education, has volunteered for the past two years. “It's amazing to see hundreds of your fellow students come together for such a great cause,” says Skinner.

In 1981, the UNM Children's Hospital Special Care Nurseries developed the Cuddler Program, which provides critically ill and premature infants with loving human interaction when their parents cannot visit every day. UNM alumna and former State Sen Tom Rutherford, who has volunteered in the program for nearly eight years, says, “When you're holding one of these little babies who needs so much help, it makes my problems seem so small.”

Volunteering at UNM is a way to build the University, the community and one's own life. Together we can give back to make our community a better place for everyone. ■

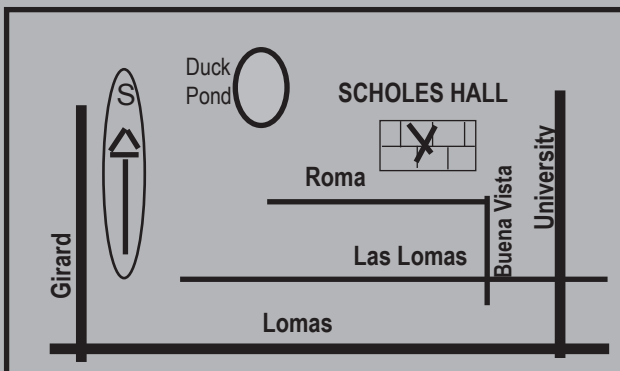

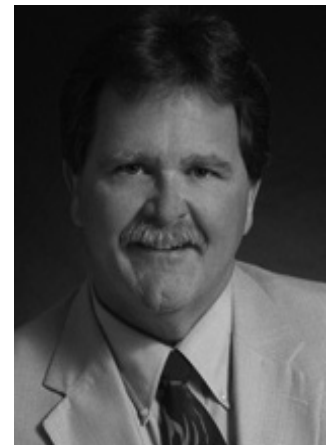

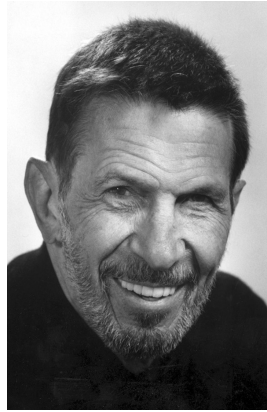

KUNM New Antenna and Transmitter Upgrades

Update by Richard S. Towne, KUNM General Manager; November 21, 2006

As of this writing we're celebrating – as I'm sure you are – the switch over to our new digital transmitter. Your patience was appreciated during this somewhat lengthy process. Allow me to take the time to tell you just what went into this venture.

Since mid-September, Interim Chief Engineer Mike Stark lead the construction and engineering upgrades for KUNM (and for KANW) at Sandia Crest. Mike had some serious assistance from two UNM students employed by KUNM. Jeff St. Louis and Thomas Chavez were instrumental providing constant help to Mike throughout the work. Jeff served as a "second pair of hands" for many days at Sandia Crest and Thomas back-stopped engineering needs at the KUNM studios by staffing the Engineering office while Mike and Jeff were up on the mountain. A super big "thumbs up" to Mike Stark for the long hours and solution-based engineering during all of the work thus far.



Mike completed construction of a new backup antenna at Sandia Crest to give us the best possible coverage while work was done on our main antenna. The new backup represented a major upgrade to our previous backup antenna. Although reception was a little less than ideal from the new backup, all rural translators were being served and reception in the service area was generally far superior to our previous backup antenna. The new backup will provide good service in the future for the inevitable case of routine maintenance on the new antenna.

Mike also completed the conversion of our analog

transmitter to the new "dual" standard of analog and digital transmission. The conversion is part of the major upgrade to our transmission facilities at the Crest. Our transmitter is now "digital ready" and digital transmission of our main analog signal will begin when the new antenna installation is complete.

The 20+ year-old master antenna was removed from our tower at Sandia Crest. The new master antenna was installed on the tower and is now connected to the transmitter. KUNM is deeply appreciative of KNME-TV's extreme cooperation during the tower work. KNME turned off their day-time programming (i.e. went off the air) for four days while the tower workers installed our antenna. This was no small sacrifice and KUNM thanks everyone from KNME management to staff for their willingness to "bite the bullet" while the work was completed. We also wish to thank Clear Channel's KBQI for reducing their signal power by 50% during our tower work.

Three big pieces of work remain -- (1) installing and tuning the new combiner, (2) implementing our FCC authorized power increase and optimizing our antenna and then, (3) adding a new STL microwave system to connect our studios at UNM to our transmitter at the Crest.

(1) The combiner is a large (4'H x 5'W x 12'L aprox.) and weirdly looking piece of gear that looks like a bunch of little garbage cans set up in parallel rows. The combiner is installed on the floor inside the transmission building (so its not so strongly affected by outside weather conditions as any work on the tower can be). The combiner does what its name implies. It combines KUNM's transmitter and KANW's transmitter into a signal that can be transmitted by a single antenna (pardon the lay-person's speak here). The wrong size combiner had been specified in the earlier days of this project. A proper size combiner is being built now and should arrive in Albuquerque around the end of November. A that time, we will need go back to reduced power for a couple of days to remove the wrong-sized combiner and the 20-year-old combiner, and finally install the new combiner.

(2) As of this writing the combiner is expected to arrive by the end of November 2006. Once the combiner is fully installed and calibrated, KUNM can contemplate its increase in effective power (about 30%) as authorized recently by the FCC. This should be a straight forward process since the transmitter KUNM purchased and installed in 2003 has been revised to handle this increase. Somewhere along the way, KUNM will also need to have outside engineers help us with calibrating and fully optimizing the transmission chain and antenna output for maximum benefit. This may result in temporary low power opera-

tions but will be the final bit of work needed at the Crest. At this point, we don't have a contemplated timeframe for the power upgrade - although it seems likely to be in early-January 2007. The antenna optimization has also not been scheduled at this point since so many other factors need to fall into place first.

(3) KUNM uses a microwave STL (Studio To Transmitter) link to send our programming from Onate Hall at UNM through the air to our transmitter at Sandia Crest. Our current STL will need to be replaced with a new system (wider bandwidth) to fully take advantage of the multicast potentials of digital transmission. Modernizing the STL will cost between \$15,000 and \$20,000 so replacement of the existing (and still functional) STL is not contemplated in the next three months. We will continue to use our existing STL until we have raised sufficient funds to cover the costs to replace the system. The STL is the last critical link in the chain for the stem-to-stern modernization of KUNM's studios and main transmitter.

The whole project at the Crest is taking an extra-ordinarily amount of choreography by many folks (the other broadcasters, the equipment manufacturers, the tower climbing crew and KUNM's own engineering staff in coordination with KANW's manager. If you are like me (and the many listeners we have heard from over the past several weeks) you are wishing this would have / could have gone a whole lot quicker. In a more perfect world, it would have. Fortunately, this type of project only happens about every fifteen years or so.

In the end, we will have completely modernized our transmission facility and we will be in the strongest possible position ever to provide analog and digital radio services to the community. We appreciate your patience, your participation and your support for these important upgrades. Let us also remember that KUNM needs to modernize and upgrade its rural translator stations and also build a new transmitter site at Espanola. As we move through completion of the main transmitter site at Sandia Crest, we will continue to invest our energies in modernizing our service to rural communities across New Mexico. ■



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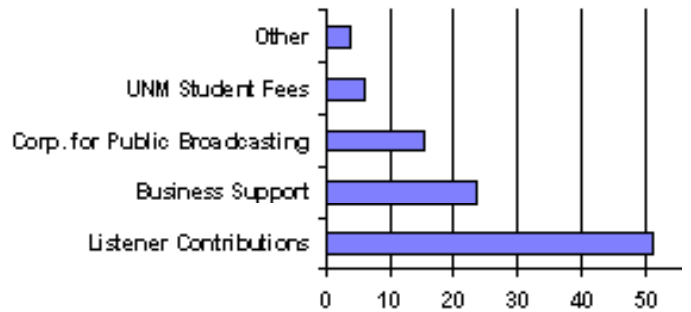
