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KUNM Community Grows to Record High in 2011

The KUNM Community grew by about 20 percent in 2011. Our total number of people listening each week rose from 93,100 in 2010 to 116,400 last year. This is pretty phenomenal in light of the plethora of channels and media options so readily available to many of us in the KUNM listening area.

Our previous high for number of listeners was 108,000 people per week in 2008. One might imagine that election years, like 2008, are especially important to a citizenry looking for in-depth information to help them with choosing ballot issues and candidates. If this is an accurate assumption, 2012 should be an excellent year for KUNM.

On average, people spent 6.3 hours per week listening to KUNM. With 116,400 people tuned in weekly for 6.3 hours, KUNM listeners are using our service for 733,320 hours of listening per week. Another way to think about this – each and every day – New Mexicans spend more than 100,000 hours listening to KUNM. So, you are really one among many who benefit from participating in our service. We are completely glad you are with us.

If we annualize our listening numbers, we come up with a total annual listening figure that is also pretty mind-boggling. Take the total number of listeners, times the average time spent listening each week, and then, multiply that times the 52 weeks in a year. You start to see the huge impact that KUNM makes in serving our listeners with high quality news, music and cultural programs.

Total listenership:

2011 = 38,132,640 hours per year (aka 38 million)

2010 = 34,372,520 hours per year (aka 34 million)

2008 = 37,065,600 hours per year (aka 37 million)

As I look at these happy numbers, I realize that if you could go get a few more of your friends to listen to KUNM just a little be longer each week, we would bust


through the 40 million hours of annual listening level. That would be really fun.

The true fact is that we each come to our listening habits on our own. You might rightly feel like these aggregate numbers are beyond comprehension and somewhat silly. That's okay by me. I present our audience data in the hopes of sharing the enormous impact that we have on this community by working together.

As a contributing listener and a public radio advocate, you are individually supporting a community service with a proud track record of meaningful service in new Mexico. I certainly thank you for being part of the KUNM community.

Method note: KUNM purchases research data twice a year from Arbitron, Inc. Data is taken from Arbitron reports for 2008, 2010 and 2011 for KUNM's designated market area. The data are estimates only. Arbitron places a statistically significant number of written diaries with people in our listening area.

Each diary keeper records all radio listening, reporting on start time, stop time, station(s) listened to, and location of listening (home, auto, office, other). Arbitron collects and collates this data and reports in back to data subscribers in each measured market. Per our agreement with Arbitron, Inc., KUNM is not allowed to rank itself against other stations in the market. $\mathbf{\hat{v}}$

Want to Live Forever?

"Do you want to live forever on a paradise Earth?" This was a question posed to one of my friends as she opened the door to a pair of total strangers one weekend afternoon. Who wouldn't like to live forever? Walt Disney had his body frozen so that when (or if) scientists find the cure for death, he can be thawed and have a chance to live again.

The older I get, the more I see that living forever in this actual physical body may not be as desirable as I imagined it to be when I was young. There are moments when just the thought of living forever could positively exhaust me.

But there are many ways to immortality, most of them appealing, even in our later years.

Children and grandchildren are one way, of course. Two weeks ago Bob Otey ("The Funkmeister"), who comes in during the last few minutes of The Blues Show to operate the sound board during the next program, burst into the control room beaming out the name, date and time of birth, and birth-weight of his very first great-grandchild. "He even has big feet—just like me!" he said, laughing. (I can't imagine Walt Disney will be any happier on his future resurrection morning than Bob was that night).

But offspring are not the only way to immortality. There's art. Cultures, religions, and enterprises of all sorts may come and go, but art is as permanent as humans can be. Often we need only say one name and a whole body of amazing, timeless work comes to mind: Rembrandt, Picasso, Dali, Frida, Michelangelo, Mozart, Gaudi, Basho, Coltrane, O'Keeffe, Monet, Hendrix, Neruda, Hiroshige, Warhol. The list could go on and on. Yes, indeed. Art is certainly one path to immortality.

Whether we have offspring or not, whether we are artists or not, we can still live on and be assured that our lives will have impact for generations to come. We do this by investing our energies and assets in our community.

Sometimes that means giving of our kindness, time, and experience to help others who need it. Sometimes it means giving others a chance by educating them or setting up organizations or policies or enterprises—or simply by believing in them and helping them to believe in themselves. The ripples of this go on and on in their lives and the lives of everyone they touch. There is no end to this legacy, though recipients down the line may never know that it was you, specifically, who intervened and helped to end their ancestors' cycle of poverty, oppression, violence, or abuse. Nonetheless, their lives will be truly better because of you. That's a legacy.

Some of us are fortunate enough to have more assets than we need in our lifetimes, even if that lifetime lasts more than a century. Those of us in that position can identify those places that are providing a service that we would like to see go on—with our help and in our names. Loy Siegenthaler was such a person. She left KUNM a bequest. It really kept the station going in a very difficult year with many challenges. It is hard to imagine how KUNM could have survived that year without it.

Dave Denny gave years of his life to KUNM, hosting first Singing Wire, then for decades, The Blues Show. We want both of their considerable gifts (of money and time respectively) to be remembered.

Forever.


There are other long-term volunteers, and others who are remembering KUNM in their estate planning. We never want to forget any of them, with their great love for this station and for people of New Mexico.

It will reside in KUNM's lobby no matter where the station is housed in future years, there to greet the illustrious and myriad guests who come in to the station for interviews or to participate in community-powered public radio in some way for generations to come.












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
